The specifics of the shootout, which revealed long-standing family and political feuds, are still hotly disputed to this day. Shawn is a former U.S. Foreign Service political officer now serving as editor in chief of The Foreign Service Journal and publications director for the American Foreign Service Association. She is the editor of the bestselling books, "Inside a U.S. Embassy: How the Foreign Service Works for America" (2003) and "Inside a U.S. Embassy: Diplomacy at Work" (2011). His lifelong love of history, especially the American Revolution and cartography, lead him to research the medical implications of that historical period and eventually write and publish a series of books. Ronald Cassell is a retired Associate Professor Emeritus of History who taught at UNCG from 1966-2003. He earned his PhD from UNC-Chapel Hill with a focus on Modern Britain and the two World Wars.

Baseball came early to the Greensboro area, the first game occurring in 1867 between a team from what is now Guilford College and "The Big Lazies" of Greensboro!
